LIST #2 Westminster 100 Book List

WHY

This program will promote the value of reading in a culture that is quickly forgetting that value. 100 books in six years will challenge participants and expand both their intellectual and cultural understanding. Furthermore, this program will enhance what is already one of the great strengths of WCA: student/faculty relationships. Faculty members who choose to be involved will act as mentors for participating students by offering support and guidance along the way.

WHAT

- The Westminster 100 is a six-year program that will require participating students to read 100 great books some of which are already part of the Westminster curriculum over the course of their time at WCA.
- Of the 100, there are 25 books on the "Core" that every student who participates will be required to read.
- To reach 100, students will select 75 other books from the offered list.
- On the list the students will receive, the titles are divided into books recommended by grade level (7-8, 9-10, 11-12) to allow students to select age appropriate books according to both content and reading level.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

I. How do students begin?

After selecting a book, students will check in with the book's sponsor to start the conversation. During the summer, a student may read the book and connect with the sponsor in August to set up a meeting.

2. How will students select which books to read?

Each book is categorized by grade-level. Level 1 is recommended for grades 7 and 8. Level 2 is recommended for 9 and 10, and Level 3 is recommended for 11 and 12. All families are encouraged to research titles for content and subject matter before selecting books.

3. How will student reading be tracked?

Each book on the Westminster 100 will have a faculty sponsor's name beside it. To begin, students will notify the sponsor of their selected book, at which time the sponsor will provide 2–3 guided questions for students to focus on as they read. Students are encouraged to check in with faculty sponsors at various points throughout the reading of each book. Finally, students will meet with the book sponsor after reading each selected book, at which time the sponsor will sign off on that specific title. If a book appears on both the Westminster 100 list and the school's curriculum, the instructor of the course can act as the sponsor and will sign off on that title for each participating student in his or her class. A running log of completed titles will be kept for each student.

4. Is any written work required to complete the Westminster 100?

No written work is required.

5. Given that the Westminster 100 is designed as a six-year program, is there a way for students who enter Westminster at the 8th grade level to take part?

Yes. To complete the program, students will be required to read 17 books (four from the core list) each year they are at Westminster. So, students who enter Westminster in 8th grade must read 65 choice and 20 core

6. What do students receive upon completion of the program?

This is a program that students can take part in at no extra cost, so there is no "carrot" dangling in front of them to motivate them to participate or finish. In addition to providing students and faculty members the opportunity to build stronger and deeper relationships, we believe the main value and reward for this program is that it encourages students to become more well–read, and in doing so, to be more well–rounded thinkers and engagers of culture.

WESTMINSTER 100 AS SUMMER READING

In order to receive credit for the Westminster 100 program, in addition to completing the summer reading assignment, a student will meet to discuss the book with its sponsor during the 1st quarter.
